COUNCIL SEEKS LAND FOR ALLOTMENTS

Landowners are being asked to contact the Town Council to discuss selling land which could be converted into much-needed allotments.

While 30 allotments in the town are already taken, there is a waiting list of 40 applicants.

Says Town Clerk Phil Burgess: "There has been a rise across the country in people wanting to grow their own fruit and vegetables, and Tenterden is no different – we have at least one resident who has been waiting two years for an allotment to come free.

"The Town Council has decided to set aside an allocation for purchasing land which could be used for more allotments."

'M TEAM' MOVE INTO NEW HQ

The council's maintenance team have moved into their state-of-the-art headquarters at the St Michael's Recreation Ground, providing new and improved facilities for the team to work from and store their equipment.

The team continues to keep the town's public spaces looking pristine, and are implementing a major programme of re-cycling and caring for the Kiln Field wildlife habitat.

The new equipment has meant the team have been able to produce 12 tonnes of compost from green materials, with a further one tonne each month to help replenish the town's flower beds and borders.

Security has been a key part of the project, and the building will be protected by 11 monitored CCTV cameras, two of which have 360 degree coverage of the Recreation Ground, retractable bollards, high grade roller shutters, and a high-spec alarm system.

NAME THE NEW ROUNDABOUT

The new roundabout at the junction of the A28 and Beacon Oak Road is to be given a name, and residents are being asked to come up with suggestions.

The roundabout – which will be paid for by Redrow, the developers of the 100-home Appledore Green development (off Tilden Gill) at a cost of £700,000 – will be on the site of an oak tree originally paid for by a Mrs Gordon of Ingleden in 1880 to mark Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.

Sadly, the tree fell victim to disease in the 1970s, and in March, 1980, the Mayor, Cllr Robert Cruttenden, planted a new tree, expressing the hope that it would always be called the Jubilee Oak.

However, that tree decayed in recent years, and was recently taken down as part of the work to build the new roundabout.

While the name Jubilee Roundabout has already been suggested, the Town Council is keen to ascertain the view of local people – but have already ruled out the idea of 'Roundy McRoundface'!

WORK CONTINUES ON 3 KEY PROJECTS

RECREATION GROUND

The first phase of the exciting re-design of the Recreation Ground, costed at £1.6 million, is going to Ashford Borough Council (ABC) for planning permission. If that is granted, work will begin next year on . . .

- A high-spec skate park, which will also attract BMX and scooter riders, informed by meetings with local skateboarders and a skate park specialist.
- A youth hub, which has been presented to local young people and youth workers, housed in an eco-friendly building.
- A multi-use games arena, and
- New tennis and netball courts.

The second phase of the scheme will feature a new children's playground with provisional design features including climbing walls, zip wire and trampoline.

TOWN HALL

The roof above the Mayor's Parlour, which suffered from rainwater leaks, has now been fixed, and all scaffolding removed. It is proposed, subject to planning permission from ABC, that work will then continue on the interior, including the provision of a multi-function networking and exhibition space, improved lighting and acoustics in the Assembly Room, and access for wheelchairs.

With £1 million already set aside for the restoration and improvements, the Town Council is set to borrow a further £750,000 to complete the project. The council proposes

submitting an application to the Public Works Loan Board, a government-backed source of funding at low interest rates for major public sector capital projects. Residents will be asked to give their approval in a public consultation.

CINEMA

Tenterden Cinema Company, the community group charged with progressing the potential for a new cinema for the town, has recommended cutting costs by up to £750,000 to help bring the project to completion, and adding more revenuegenerating activity to help its financial viability. The cinema industry throughout the UK has suffered badly through the pandemic, and discussions on the project between the company and the council have been suspended until the New Year to assess the best way forward. In the meantime, the company would be conferring with other cinema operators on their views on the industry, and an indication of their willingness to invest in a Tenterden cinema. Tom Evans of the Tenterden Cinema Company said: "We continue to believe that a neighbourhood cinema development would have a major impact on the town's regeneration, postpandemic, but the present scheme is too expensive" The projected cost of a two-screen cinema is around £3 million, of which the council has pledged £500,000 to cover initial surveys, designs, fees and repairs to The Pebbles building.

NEW HOMES IN TENTERDEN -COUNCIL DECISIONS

Applications to build new homes in Tenterden go first to the Town Council as a consultee. The Town Council's recommendation for refusal or acceptance then goes to Ashford Borough Council (ABC) for determination. If ABC also refuses the application, the developer has a final right of appeal to the national Planning Inspectorate.

Applications currently going through that system include....

- Limes Land A major development of 250 new homes and a country park, off the Woodchurch Road and Appledore Road.
 - Tenterden Town Council refused. ABC – refused.
- Westwell Court A 56-bed care home, 19 cottages and seven flats on land between Rogersmead and Cranbrook Road cemetery.

Tenterden Town Council - refused.

- London Beach Plans for a development of 60 two-bed flats for active retirees, resubmitted as a 12-flat development, with an outline application for an additional 12 flats. Tenterden Town Council – refused. ABC – permission granted
- Smallhythe Road 54 apartments for older people.

Tenterden Town Council - approved, subject to conditions.

ABC – no decision. Developers have gone to appeal.

Meanwhile, the council has made its views crystal clear on the government's proposals to relax planning law.

Planning committee chairman John Crawford described them as "reckless, unsound and unwarranted", and said that if they went ahead, the Town Council would have little or no influence over where houses would be built, or ensure they met the needs of the community.

THE SPIRIT OF POSITIVITY

How the council, community and commerce came together

Tenterden and St Michael's coped outstandingly with the resurgence of Covid-19 and the November lockdown, with the Town Council, businesses and the community ensuring the town remained open and operational as much as possible.

Key figures in the regeneration of Tenterden's economy have been working hard to develop a strategy for helping the High Street and other businesses during the pandemic and beyond.

An initial meeting was called by Tenterden's new Town Centre and Tourism Co-ordinator, Keli Nolan-Lyons in September, and involved the Mayor, Cllr Jean Curteis, Tenterden & District Chamber of Commerce secretary Mike Bartlett, James Fuller, originator of Our Tenterden Business Team, and Cllr Sue Ferguson of the MyTenterden website.

Ideas were then fed into meetings of the High Street Regeneration sub-committee, which has been considering initiatives such as a local App promoting Tenterden businesses; assessing the demand for small businesses to share office space; reviewing the possibility of designing a colour palette for the frontages of High Street retailers to create a clear design identity for the town; and further improvements to parking.

As the November lockdown was imposed, the council issued a factsheet, pointing local businesses to government and Ashford Borough Council support initiatives and grants.

And, with the approach of Christmas trading, the council successfully applied for a continuation of the free parking scheme to the end of December, freeing up around 180 spaces for shoppers and those working in town centre businesses.

Said Town Clerk Phil Burgess: "The absolute commitment of the council, local businesses and the whole community to ensuring the local economy has remained fully supported has led to a spirit of positivity – in recent weeks, at least six new businesses have opened up in town, and local websites have been instrumental in helping the town towards a brighter future."

COUNCIL'S £20,000 INVESTMENT IN YOUTH FOR 2021

The Town Council is investing £20,000 in a new programme for the town's young people, including street sessions to reach those who would not normally go to the local Youth Cafe.

The council has teamed up with Sk8side, the Ashford-based community interest company, which has provided design input and advice on Tenterden's new skatepark, scheduled to be built on the Recreation Ground next year.

Now, Sk8side has been given an additional brief to extend their existing work managing the twice-weekly Youth Cafe sessions at Highbury Hall, which will re-locate to a new youth hub next year as part of the Recreation Ground revamp.

Sk8side – which has more than 300 members in Ashford - will also be offering an additional 'outreach' service in Tenterden, going out onto the streets to engage difficult-to-reach local youngsters who would not normally go to the Youth Café.

Explains Town Clerk Phil Burgess: "The Sk8side team have had great success in reaching young people in Ashford, and channelling their talents into productive outcomes."

A key element of the Sk8side offering is to help move young people from being NEET (Not in Employment, Education or Training) onto workshops to improve their personal and social skills, backed up with a work placement scheme.

There are also programmes on drug awareness, sexual health and housing, as well as encouraging youngsters to run day trips to help build their confidence and organisational abilities.

TOWN SETS CLIMATE CHANGE TARGETS

In January 2020, the Town Council passed a resolution committing it to become carbon neutral by 2030. A Climate Change Committee has been set up, with both council and resident members to meet this ambitious and urgent target.

We will be setting up a dedicated Youth Climate Change Panel and working closely with both the Wildlife Committee and the Neighbourhood Plan Committee to give Tenterden a truly green future.

Immediate projects include putting the Town Council's house in order – installing solar panels on council buildings where possible, pushing for an improved electric vehicle point infrastructure and a local Terracycle recycling scheme that processes coffee pods/foil food pouches and beauty products.

We are working closely with the Tenterden Civil Society and the Neighbourhood Plan committee on a sustainable transport conference to be held in early 2021, and are reaching out to other towns and parishes which are working on reducing single-use plastics - and will be launching a 'Plastic Free Tenterden' campaign in 2021.

"The way that the community is pulling together at this time of year is inspirational, and the council is delighted to have been able to help the railway – and Santa, in particular".
